


one another again.

Admittedly, there were a few moments of frustration but patience and persistence won out, and I was able to successfully log on. I used Google Chrome as my browser and would suggest that you do that if you can. I have a Gmail account for my email anyway. Now, I am only speaking from my own experience, not from Chris's nor from Bill's perspective! I tried using my Safari browser and found it did not work for me as well as Google so I switched. I played with the mic button, the people button, found the blur button that could hide my background so that you couldn't notice the mess behind me. With Safari I did not have some of those buttons!

I asked Bill Tarlton to write an article about Google Meet to share with you in this Newsletter, hoping that you will study it, read through and, maybe give him a call if you want to try and log on or have questions before the next December meeting. I have a Mac Notebook that I use and it works fine. I could use my iPhone but I couldn't see as much as I want to. Watching the meeting on Google Meet was fun as different people popped in, even Patricia McRae from Oregon. She showed us some great views out her house windows of the mountains where she now lives.

You can also participate in the Show & Tell part of the Meeting from your home by having your item ready in from of your computer. Takes a bit of practice to know where to place it.

I admit a Google Meet is not the same as a IDGS meeting at Woodcraft but it sure is nice seeing fellow gourd members' faces, like Chia Wood, Wanda Walker and Vicky Mcintyre. Message from IDGS Vice-President Bill Tarlton about Google Meet

Over the past year, we haven't been able to come together for our monthly Woodcraft meetings. That means missed opportunities to socialize, get current information regarding IDGS board planning activities, participate in "Show and Tells", listen to and discuss membership concerns, contribute to and possibly win the monthly raffle, and unlike myself – win the \$10 Woodcraft gift card. I believe many of you also miss the chance to learn new techniques taught at the end of each meeting. That's quite a departure from just one of our activities. Just to mention a few others that have (hopefully temporarily) been very limited or cancelled in 2020 are; the summer picnic, patch meetings, our IDGS Gourd Show, and the ever-popular Christmas party. It's been sparse pickings.

I'm here to testify to the yeoman efforts of the IDGS Board of Directors to think outside of the box in search of alternatives to all the activities mentioned above. I can also tell you that Ron Swank pushes us to come up with ideas that continue to promote IDGS and move us toward getting us back together. One of those ideas was to find a way to use virtual systems similar to those used by businesses and schools. You may have heard the term "Zoom Meetings". I was assigned the task of exploring virtual meeting alternatives and with the help of Chris Peters and the board's approval we chose Google Meet as a platform for our membership to meet. As a practical matter we are also implementing it for our Kuna Patch meetings.

Our first foray into virtual meetings was the November 2020 monthly meeting. As with all new adventures, it was filled with lots of hiccups and accompanying anxiety to get it right the first time. We did a number of trial runs prior to the actual meeting and, for the most part, figured it out by the time of the meeting. We ended up with a total of 19 participants. While that wasn't bad for the first time, I believe we can and will do much better in the future. This article is intended to highlight lessons learned and provide detailed instructions to assist you when you attempt to log into future virtual meetings. We hope to increase participation as members become more familiar with the process.

In order to log into any virtual meeting, you will need access to one of the following:

- Desktop computer with a Webcam that has an integrated microphone.
- Laptop computer webcam and microphones are standard on laptops.
- Smart Phone

Note: Access to your email on the device your using for the meeting will make it easier, i.e. if you're using your Smart Phone then being able to accessing your emails on that phone helps. With a phone and accompanying email, you would be able to login to the meeting from anywhere.

PHONE:

There is a difference between Apple I-Phone and Android based phones. If you have an I-Phone you will need to download the Google Meet application from the I-store onto that phone. Below is the icon that you will see on the I-Store. Simply follow the directions for downloading – the application is free.

Most Android phones will come pre-loaded with google applications – including Google Meet. If you find that's not the case with your phone, you can go to Google Play Store and download the application there.

Once the applications are on your device, it just becomes a matter of clicking on the icon to join a meeting or even set up a meeting of your own. I use it to meet with family. It's a great way to see and visit those living in other states.

Google Meet



LAPTOP and DESKTOP: If you have a GMail account you already have the ability to meet. In the left-hand column of your Gmail homepage you will see "Meet" and the options for New Meeting and Join meeting. When you receive an email invitation that contains an Invite link and you click on the invite it will take you right to the "Join"

meeting page as shown in the screen capture below.

If you don't use Gmail, you can simply type Google Meet into the search engine and select the following:

That will take you to the Application and offer an option to install. You may have to create a Google Account in order to install it. The application is free.

THE PROCESS:

Once your device is set up for Google Meet, you can either start your own meeting or join a scheduled meeting or a meeting in progress. Normally, a scheduled meeting is announced via an email from the moderator. That email will include an invitation similar to this:

Note: in this example the meeting code is shown (under the green Join Meeting button) as **gsr-haws-hxn.** If you don't have an email invitation, you can always join a meeting as long as you know the meeting code. if you find yourself disconnected from a meeting you can always go back to the original email link or rejoin by typing in the code.

The moderator will receive a notification that you want to join the meeting. At that point he/she will hit an "Admit" button which will take you into the meeting. Be sure your camera is on and your microphone is on. You will be able to see and talk to everyone in the meeting.

Once in the meeting you may receive instructions such as: mute your microphone or to turn on your camera. The screenshot below shows how/where to do that. Additional screenshots below show you how to determine who else is in attendance; how to turn on the chat mode; how to turn on the captions function and how to disconnect from a call. Tips:


Please mute (turn off) your microphone except when speaking.



If you want only to listen, turn off your camera.



Find Chat at the top right of the Meet window. Clicking on the people icon will show people in the meeting.



CAPTIONS--Turn captions on/off:

iPad, iPhone and Android phones

At bottom right tap More 3 vertical dots


Tap turn on CC or turn off CC captions

Computer

At the bottom of the Meet window, click Turn On captions CC or Turn Off captions CC Tip: If the captions are covered by your call controls, click anywhere else inside the Meet window to dismiss them.




To disconnect or leave the call tap the red phone handle.



To rejoin click the link in your original email

Hopefully this article was helpful and will encourage you to join our virtual meetings in the future. While it is not the same as in-person meetings, it is a safe alternative and offers a chance to see and talk to others about the thing that draws all of us together – GOURDS.

Chris Peters taught an unusual carving class at Liz Mevers' to a group of ten class participants in October. I say unusual as Chris utilized the large screen tv in Liz Myer's workshop as a class tool in teaching. It really was a wonderful aid in explaining detailed techniques that everyone could easily see. In earlier classes we would all gather round a table and watch the instructor. Now, from our seats we can easily watch on the large screen, detailed steps in a large format, steps which can be carefully detailed. The instructor can stop at any point for further explanation. In the picture to the left Chris is carefully carving with the camera capturing her movements. The picture on the left below shows the TV screen as we would see it. Look at the detail we can see that, otherwise, would be missed. It would not be possible to see all of this from the standing position. Below, the detailed picture, is a screen shot of a slide Chris prepared to explain a technique. That new flat screen tv has opened a new world of possibilities for our classes in the future.
